Lesson Topic: Introduction to the War in Vietnam

Outcomes & Expectations:

Key Questions:

- 1. Why did the Vietnam War start?
- 2. Who is involved in the Vietnam War?
- 3. When was the Vietnam War?
- 4. Where did the Vietnam War take place?

Application of Knowledge:

Students should understand the key building up events to the Vietnam War and the transition from the Second World War into the Cold War context of the Vietnam War, long-standing French occupation and its tense battle of diplomatic relations. Students will additionally be able to identify the parties involved, the where and when of the events that took place, the relevance of Communism, and the initial reasoning for US involvement.

Assessment Strategies & Tools:

Formative Assessment – Exit Ticket \rightarrow students can hand in a quick exit ticket with them outlining the 5 W's of the Vietnam War to be marked at the end of class or they can take them home to complete and hand in the next day (to be collected at the beginning of class).
